This highlight report outlines just some of the incredible work undertaken by, or in partnership with our community hubs.

Since I became Cabinet Member for Communities, Social Justice and Wealth Building in 2019, I have sought to give community hubs much needed autonomy, to champion social justice at every opportunity, and to create real wealth building in our Borough.

Reading this report give me a huge sense of pride; the impact of the work undertaken over the last twelve months is truly amazing. It is clear to see how our efforts have raised aspirations, created meaningful opportunities and supported vulnerable residents and families with compassion and dignity.

As a Council, we have listened to parish councils, community groups and grassroots organisations. Our cross-party review of community involvement really tested the function of community hubs, and challenged the tangible outcomes they produce. Consequently, the level of investment we have targeted towards community infrastructure and development has been increased to unprecedented levels.

We know that communities change, and that our role is to continually evolve to remain responsive. Our hub model has been appraised by peer reviewers and the Local Government Association, with overwhelmingly positive feedback.

Looking forward, I have no doubt that our hubs will go from strength to strength in their delivery. It is my pleasure to lead such pioneering work here in South Ribble.




## **Civic Pride**

The live music events were held virtually throughout the pandemic due to social distancing restrictions, however in 2022 they were back with a bang!

For both events it was is busiest year to date, with an estimated attendance of 3,000 at both Penwortham Live and Longton Live.

These events enhance community spirit and received excellent feedback from both residents and elected members.









# Farington & Friends Fun Day

This event provided families with access to a wide range of free activities, with a focus on celebrating equality, diversity, and accessibility.

This included storytelling, Dr Bike, information stalls, accessible hockey, and show and tell from Lancashire Fire and Rescue.







## Active Health in Schools

A wide range of activities have been delivered in schools in all of the Community Hub areas, with a total of 2,655 sessions held throughout the 2022/23 year. These activities create many positive outcomes for young people, including but not limited to, increasing physical fitness, learning about nutrition, developing new skills and abilities, and improving confidence. The number of sessions held for each type of activity are shown below.


### Active Travel – Dr Bike

Many people have bikes that they do not use due to minor mechanical faults – this acts as a barrier, preventing them from using their bikes for both exercise and as a mode of transport.

The Dr Bike initiative provides residents with a free to access service, where they can bring along their bike and have bike engineers from the Active Health team carry out repairs. If residents also need to increase their confidence prior to riding their bike, they can book onto community bike rides led by Active Health coaches.

To date, 8 events have taken place across South Ribble, with an average of 11 bikes being fixed per session. This has created estimated savings of £3,080 for residents based on £35 Halfords services.

These sessions have been held in the following locations, often alongside members from the Community Hub area, holding Community Conversations: Withy Grove, Lostock Hall, Kingsfold, Fox Lane, St Mary's, Farington Fun day, CNOS, Gregson Lane Community Centre.





# Case study of LT, Leyland who first attended St Mary's Community Centre Dr Bike

"It's an excellent idea for all those old or broken bikes that are sitting unused in the garage."

- Has diabetes. Advised to walk/bike 5 miles a day to keep it under control. Walking takes him 1.5 hours.
- His wife spotted the Bike Repair Pop-up on Facebook and suggested he dug his old bike out of the garage to get fixed and get back on it. Will take him half the time to do 5 miles a day cycling rather than walking.
- The last time John rode his bike, he fell off it and into a brook. It knocked his confidence and he has been too scared to get back on it.
- Once his bike is fixed, John is interested in joining Dave Boyle's free weekly community bike rides. Proven to reduce social isolation and loneliness.
- Since the event, JT has attended more than 3 guided rides and usually the first name on our registers when launching the rides.

#### An extract from a letter of thanks from Appleby Wood School, Lostock Hall

Today we have had David and Nigel from SRBC bike servicing and repair team, come to school and make 13 bikes usable for our SEN pupils. The smile on the pupils faces as they rode the bikes around the school track. One of our 14year old pupils had never been on a bike until today. We asked the local community for help by donating any unused bikes. We received about 30 in total but none of them were usable and none of our staff able to repair due to the sudden leaving of our school caretaker.

Today David and Nigel have made such a difference. They were both amazing with the pupils, some of whom can be very challenging, they were both friendly, chatty, polite and they went way above and beyond our expectation. This will be a huge benefit to school and to our pupils. Thank you very, very, much for all that you have done today. You will never know how appreciated it has been.

### Active Travel – Bikes for job seekers

This scheme utilises donated bikes/bikes from Active Lancashire and helps job seekers access employment by loaning out bikes. This provides job seekers with free travel, the ability to access employment opportunities further afield, and also improves their physical health.

5 Bikes have been loaned out to date, with donations coming from Key Unlocking Futures, Progress Housing Group, DWP, and Lancashire County Council's Homes for Ukraine scheme.

### Active Travel – Community Bike Rides

Community bike rides help residents build confidence and competence to cycle safely, both on the roads and within parks and open spaces.

In 2022/23, 10 community rides have taken place, with an average of 7 people per ride and covering an average distance of 9 miles. This totals approximately 700 individual miles by residents.

To date, rides have been launched from: Western Parishes, Leyland, Bamber Bridge, and Penwortham.

It was all well organized and well planned by Dave Boyle the ride leader and enjoyed by all who attended. Many thanks to them both for putting it on. It was great to socialize with a nice group of fellow cyclists after some time out due the pandemic and today's ride has certainly left me wanting to further explore the South Ribble area a bit more. I'll be back again before long – it's a lovely area and there is no better way of seeing it than by the humble bicycle. Here's hoping for more of the same over the coming year!

### Mental Health First Aid

In the aim to improve knowledge and capacity within the community for identifying mental health challenges, managing conversations about mental health, and making appropriate referrals, 8 mental health first aid courses have been delivered across South Ribble in 2022/23. These courses have been delivered across all five Community Hub areas, targeting community stakeholders and partners that have frequent and meaningful contact with residents.

To date, this has included individuals from local government, Police, Fire, NHS, housing associations, community groups, schools, sports clubs, and more. All courses have been delivered by local mental health charity and partner, Lancashire Mind.

2 suicide first aid courses are scheduled to be delivered in May 2023. These will be promoted to all existing mental health first aiders. A Mental Health Forum will also be launched in May, where mental health first aiders will come together for peer support, and to discuss current and emerging issues relating to mental health.

Following a report to Cabinet in January 2023 that presented a Mental Health Action Plan, a further £20,000 has been allocated to fund mental health first aid courses throughout 2023, in addition to £5,000 for mental health awareness and events, and £20,000 for building on provision relating to social isolation.

## **Dementia Friendly Communities**

The Communities team provides resource to coordinate the South Ribble Dementia Action Alliance. The Alliance aims to enhance the quality of life of people living with dementia (and their carers) in South Ribble, through setting objectives, and the delivery of projects and activities. Activity throughout 2022/23 has included:

- Holding an event with over 50 partners to discuss current and emerging issues.
- Creating over 50 new Dementia Friends through the delivery of Dementia Friends sessions.
- Almost 20 banners have been placed throughout the borough encouraging individuals and businesses to become more dementia friendly.
- A living well walk was held in September through Longton Nature Reserve to celebrate World Alzheimer's Day 2022.







## Social Isolation

Significant work continues to be carried out to combat social isolation and loneliness across South Ribble. This includes:

- Further development of the resocialisation cafes established during the pandemic. These were established to ease residents back into socialising following reports of increased social anxiety. There are now 9 cafes that operate across the borough on a weekly basis, which are funded until 2025.
- Supporting the expansion of Talkin Tables, who now operate in Leyland, Penwortham, Lostock Hall, Bamber Bridge, and Longton.
- The establishment of a Social Isolation Network, to share best practice amongst community groups, encourage collaborative working, and discuss current and emerging issues.
- Development of a Directory of Services and Activities this outlines all social isolation and loneliness provision throughout the borough, as well as complementing services.
- Installation of over 15 'Happy to Chat' benches across the borough.

## Lancashire Youth Challenge

South Ribble Borough Council acknowledged the impact the pandemic had on young people's confidence, self-esteem and connection with their peers particularly those who were in the transitional years from primary school to high school. As a result, Lancashire Youth Challenge was commissioned to deliver a series of workshops and their pilot 'RESTORE' programme. RESTORE is a 12-week programme of activities, aimed to enhance young people's physical and emotional wellbeing through creativity, fitness and outdoor adventure.

Students from Lostock Hall Academy and Worden took part in yoga and personal training sessions to develop their physical fitness and mental wellbeing. The groups were empowered to creatively express their views on the world in which they live through drumming, beatboxing, spoken word and filmmaking. The 'Challenge Day' saw both groups push out of their comfort zone and build strong relationships with their peers as they supported one another to tackle ghyll scrambling and canoeing at Coniston amongst other outdoor activities.

The penultimate projects for the groups saw Lostock Hall Academy develop spoken word poetry, sound and video to produce a short film entitled 'My Life is a Playground'. Using various references to school playground games as a metaphor for the emotional challenges they overcome at school through the support of peers and resilience building.





### New project by South Ribble Council restores self-esteem of South Ribble teenagers post pandemic

Teenage students at schools in South Ribble have taken part in a new project aiming to improve their self-esteem and confidence post-pandemic.

Worden produced an immersive photo-poetic exhibition based on their experiences. The exhibition showcased photographs taken by the group to instil the importance of individual experiences and the impact they have on perceptions of the world.

Attendees of the exhibition were able to understand the importance of self-concept and individuality in a sensory stimulating and immersive experience via the photographs and soundscapes exhibited.

The pupils that took part in LYC's RESTORE programme have highlighted that gaining trust, developing confidence, building personal resilience, making new friends and having fun.

Worden Academy's progress and intervention manager, Kate Green, said: "Taking part in this intervention has given our students an opportunity to find their voice and express themselves in ways they wouldn't believe they were capable of. They have been pushed out of their comfort zones but felt confident throughout due to the patience and kindness of all the staff involved.

"It has been great to have a variety of activities tackling both physical and emotional challenges. The outdoor adventure day was fantastic and provided a unique experience for our pupils that they will never forget."





### Youth Council

The Youth Council is a group of young people aged 13-17 that meet on a biweekly basis to engage in local decision making (providing a voice for young people), debate about issues important to them, and deliver thematic projects to create a positive impact across our communities. This is a development platform for young people, with the aim of creating future community leaders. Activity has included, but is not limited to:

- Consultation on mental health workshops delivered in schools by Lancashire Youth Challenge. This provided Youth Council members with the opportunity to co-design the content delivered to their peers.
- Creation of a 'Community Christmas Tree' in the Shield Room. Containing positive messages from Youth Council members and partners.
- Delivered a presentation at Cabinet in the Community, providing first-hand accounts of what it like to be a Youth Council member receiving positive feedback from both members and residents.
- Taken part in interviews to be featured on Radio Leyland.









### **Projects:**

The first project theme chosen by the Youth Council was 'Cost of Living'. The Youth Council decided to hold a 3-day pop up shop event named the 'Festive Freecycle'. The free shops in Leyland, Bamber Bridge and Penwortham offered warm winter clothes and toys, which the Youth Council hoped would help members of the community in the winter months, as well as offer people the opportunity to have a 'conscious Christmas' by regifting the items on offer in the shops.

In order to prepare for the events, the Youth Council created a series of advertisements that were put on social media, requesting donations and promoting the pop-up shop events. By hosting Q&A sessions with Community Development and Communications officers, the Youth Council gained valuable insights and support regarding project planning, health and safety and advertisement.

Following a successful first project, Youth Council members identified youth mental health as their next area of focus.

## **Boost Fund**

### Round 3 – March 2022

Successful applications were:

- The installation of planters in schools across the Bamber Bridge, Lostock Hall & Walton-le-Dale area (to be completed in March 2023).
- Funds for equipment for the Garden Angels project in the Western Parishes (ongoing).
- Installation of life saving belts across the Penwortham side of the River Ribble (ongoing).
- Shelving and trollies for Leyland Foodbank (complete).

### Round 4 - October 2022 (Warm Welcome)

Successful applications were:

- Preston North End 'Kicks' programme to be delivered on Friday evenings for 6-months at Withy Grove Sports Hub to reduce reports of anti-social behaviour.
- Funding to all hubs to support Warm Welcome initiatives. This has included:
  - Creating winter warmth packs to be distributed to vulnerable residents.
  - Providing grants to community venues to provide a warm welcome / warm space. This has created over 15 new warm spaces for residents to attend across South Ribble.

All venues providing a Warm Welcome can be found on the council's website.



## Foodbanks and Community Shops

The Council coordinates a 'Community Food Network', where foodbanks and community shops across South Ribble come together to network, share information, discuss current and emerging issues, identify opportunities for collaboration, and share surplus stock.

Members of the network includes Leyland Foodbank, Penwortham Foodbank, New Day Church Food Hub (Lostock Hall), Christian Community Larder (Bamber Bridge), The Base Community Shop (Broadfield, Leyland), Wade Hall Community Shop (Leyland), Community Network Outreach Service Community Shop (Moss Side, Leyland), and TippyToes Baby Bank.

Between these members, approximately 350-450 families and individuals are supported each week with either free or significantly subsidised food and household essentials.

Activity to support foodbanks and community shops over the past 12 months includes:

- Providing each foodbank/community shop with grants from various grant programmes using external funding.
- Supporting foodbanks to develop their model into a community shop model, increasing dignity for those that they support.
- Supported Brownedge Christians Together Food Bank to develop into a community shop through the Bamber Bridge, Lostock Hall and Walton-le-Dale funding a new community larder (converted shipping container).
- Providing access to free training, including food hygiene and digital skills courses.
- Work with partners that offer complementing services to attend community shops and cafes (i.e. Citizen's Advice, Christians Against Poverty).
- Allocated funding in the council's annual budget for a premise for Tippy Toes Baby Bank.







## Cost of Living / South Ribble Together

The Council is leading work to support residents through the Cost of Living crisis, including chairing a multi-agency working group, with membership from organisations including DWP, Progress Housing, Citizens Advice Bureau and Key Unlocking Futures. This builds on the successful South Ribble Together COVID response

A Cost of Living conference was held in August 2022, with key local partners to discuss the challenges being faced, and how we can work together to support our residents. Insightful feedback was received from representatives from local foodbanks, charities, churches, health workers and volunteers. The working group has created an action plan which focuses on outcomes which will make a real and tangible difference to households in South Ribble.



Some of the work carried out to date:

- Webpages created <u>southribble.gov.uk/southribbletogether</u> to enable 24/7 access to information on support services
- Help Through Crisis commissioned through Citizens Advice Bureau for intensive
- A cost of living marketplace event for residents to drop in and access assistance
- Enhanced HAF school holiday activity programme food and toiletries provided
- Locally funded HAF Plus activities in October 2022 and February 2023
- Warm Homes grants schemes
- Funding and practical support to South Ribble Community Food Network adding capacity to community shops and pantries
- Pledge to the national warm welcome campaign warmwelcome.uk
- Use of Household Support Funding to provide:
  - vouchers for gas, energy and water
  - energy adaptations such as boiler replacements, new windows, loft insulation
  - flooring, curtains, warm clothing and bedding
  - move-on funding for women's refuge and youth homelessness schemes
  - funding to help people sustain tenancies and prevent breakdown
  - crisis grants to extremely vulnerable residents
  - shopping vouchers for fresh food from Leyland Market
  - food parcels, toiletries and cleaning products



## School Uniform Shop

Following a successful project in 2021, the uniform shop was delivered again in 2022, however this time from a retail unit on Hough Lane, Leyland. This aimed to increase the dignity for shoppers, using plain discreet carrier bags as you would receive from any other shop.

Over a three-week period, this scheme supported 607 families with over 1,500 items of school uniform. Positive feedback was received from residents that attended – explaining that the scheme helped relieve financial pressures.

# TippyToes Winter Warmth Pop Up Shop

This project supported families over the winter period by providing free warm clothing and blankets, donated by residents. This was a one-day event and supported over 100 families.

Positive feedback was received from those that attended.

This included a family with 6 children of varying ages, where the eldest (11-year old boy) explained to one of the volunteers that his mum had been crying due to the worry of purchasing new coats. This project meant she no longer had to worry. He took away a new coat and was so pleased he did not want to take it off.





## Pop-up Bike Shop


Following the delivery of various active travel projects, the Active Health team had some spare bike remaining. These bikes were used to deliver low-cost bike shops, to help families access affordable but quality Christmas presents. A small fee was charged for the bikes to prevent the scheme being taken advantage of, whilst also mirroring the sense of dignity and ownership which struggling families get from the community shop model (small charge in return for higher value goods).

The team organised 3 pop-up shops to be held at the Civic Centre (Leyland), Bamber Bridge Leisure Centre, and Penwortham Community Centre (Kingsfold). The times of each shop were 4:30pm-6:30pm. All monies collected from the shops were donated to the Mayor's Charity. The shops achieved an amazing total of £1210.

#### In total 60 bikes were sold.

I visited the event and managed to buy an adult female bike. I just wanted to email and say a massive thank you!! I have wanted a bike for a long time with the purpose of using it to nip to the shops, get exercise and encourage my daughter, aged 5, to learn to ride (with the hope that at some point we can go on bike rides together). I work and I understand I am more fortunate than many. However, as a single parent my income goes on my child, the home and basics. I couldn't justify the expense of a bike and spending that money on myself. Your scheme has been a fabulous solution! The fact the bike was checked was excellent. However, the fact I received a bag of goodies that would have cost more than the bike was absolutely amazing. I used the voucher to purchase a helmet after the event. Thank you to those who organised the scheme and also to the people that ran and prepped the event-after speaking to them it was clear how much work had gone into it. (LS, Bamber Bridge) At his age there's no point buying brand new because he grows so fast. This is perfect (Parent, Bamber Bridge)

## **Positive Diversionary Activities**

Penwortham Community Hub piloted a positive diversionary activities project in partnership with the Active Health team. This involved opening the AstroTurf pitch at Penwortham Priory for 'Turn Up & Play' sessions, targeting young people in secondary school aged 11-16. The session on Tuesday 14th engaged 96 young people over the course of 3 hours. The Session on Thursday 16th engaged 62 Young People. Following a successful pilot, other Community Hubs have expressed an interest in running similar schemes in their areas.

Further to this, the Bamber Bridge, Lostock Hall and Walton-le-Dale Community Hub have commissioned Preston North End to run their 'Kicks' programme on Friday evenings at Withy Grove Sports Hub, aiming to reduce reports of anti-social behaviour. These sessions are due to start in March.
