



Procedure for all hearings before Licensing Panel to determine applications made under the Licensing Act 2003

### **Preliminary Points**

It has been agreed by Licensing Committee that, in addition to the Declaration of any personal or prejudicial interest (in accordance with the Local Government Act 2000):-

- Any member in whose ward an application premises is situated will declare this and will not take any further part in the hearing of the application
- Any member of a Licensing Panel who wishes to either support or oppose the granting of a licence either personally or on behalf of their constituents, must attend either as a supporter of the application or as an objector and sit in the public gallery. The panel on which that member serves may not hear the application
- Subject to section 100A of the Local Government Act 1972, the panel may exclude the public from all or part of a hearing where it considers that the public interest in doing so outweighs the public interest in the hearing, or that part of the hearing, taking place in public. This will include, at the discretion of the panel the exclusion of the public during its deliberations and its decision making.

### **Hearing Process**

- 1) General Introduction by Chairman.
- 2) In accordance with the Regulation 23 of The Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005 the Chairman of the panel will lead the discussion.
- 3) A Licensing Officer will briefly outline the application for the licence and the procedure to be followed in the hearing.
- 4) Applicant(s) Case

The objector(s) and/or their representatives and the panel may ask questions of the applicant and/or their representatives.

- 5) Objector(s) Case(s)

The applicant and/or their representatives and the panel may ask questions of the objector(s) and/or their representatives.

- 6) The Chairman will then ask the applicant if, in light of the representations, they wish to amend the application. The panel will only consider the application laid before it during the decision making.

- 7) Summing up;
  - i) Objector(s) Case(s)
  - ii) Applicant(s) Case

- 8) Conclusion

The Chairman will ask the Licensing Authority Legal Representative whether there are any other matters to be raised or resolved before the hearing is closed for deliberations.

- 9) Deliberations

Generally speaking the public and the applicant will be excluded when the panel is determining the hearing decision. Once a decision has been reached all parties will be readmitted to the hearing. At this stage the chairman will announce the panel's decision and will give reasons for the decision.

- 10) Notice of Decision

All parties will be notified of the decision at the earliest possible opportunity.

This application for a review of the premises licence arises as a result of the number of incidents associated with the premises since the beginning of the year, which in turn have led to a number of crimes being reported over half of which are assaults. It also appears that the vast majority of these incidents occur at the weekend from Friday through till the early hours of Monday morning and of these three quarters of these calls are received after midnight.

This would also tend to confirm reports, received by the local policing team, from residents in the vicinity of these premises that they are being disturbed by noise and anti-social behaviour. This is attributed, by local residents, to drunken customers leaving these premises in the early hours of the morning.

The police have had a number of meetings with the previous operator when concerns have arisen and have been supportive in his attempt to run the business.

However since April there has been a change in operator and these issues seem to have increased despite a meeting with the new operator and his solicitor where they both gave assurances that they would address the issues raised.

The police now feel that the premises is undermining the Prevention of Crime and Disorder and the Prevention of Public Nuisance licensing objectives.

These premises have the benefit of a Premises Licence the holder of which is Ravenstone North West Limited, the current DPS being Alison Guyan. The premises currently has authority for the provision of alcohol by retail sale until midnight Monday to Wednesday, 01:00 hrs Thursday and Sunday and 02:00 hrs Friday and Saturday. The premises is permitted to remain open to the public for an additional hour after the provision of licensable activity each day. It also has authority to provide licensable activity for an additional hour on Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday for each Bank Holiday weekend.

The premises operating as Barristers has been subject to a number of variations to the premises licence and DPS over the last few years. There have also been a number of meetings with the then operator to discuss concerns over incidents that have occurred at the premises. The police would say that these meetings have always been positive and that the operator has been willing to work with the police to resolve any problems.

A documented history of this is attached at Appendix 1.

At the beginning of May this year the premises licence was transferred to Ravenstone North West Ltd, the director being Lee Smurthwaite, the DPS at that time was Alison Guyan who despite the change remained as DPS. However it is the police's understanding that the premises were being operated by this company from the beginning of April.

On 7<sup>th</sup> May the police licensing officer in company with the council licensing officer attended the premises to speak with the operator regarding an incomplete transfer application and to discuss some incidents connected to the premises. The officers were accompanied by the local CBM PC Thompson who had concerns over the apparent increase in incidents at the premises. She had also been receiving complaints from residents relating to the premises and it's customers at closing time.

The concerns and observations from PC Thompson are contained within a statement a copy of which is attached at Appendix 2.

The operator Lee Smurthwaite was not present at the premises so the officers spoke to the DPS Alison Guyan.

As a result of this meeting advice was given in relation to having the appropriate policies in place, particularly around the dispersal of customers and in relation to drunkenness with documented staff training. The DPS was advised that there were issues with the premises and that if these were not addressed then a review would be considered with a view to reducing the hours of operation.

Following on from this meeting a further meeting was requested by the operators, this took place on Wednesday 28<sup>th</sup> May at the Council Offices in Leyland. Present at the meeting was representatives from the police and council licensing departments as well as Darren Miller, the previous operator, Lee Smurthwaite the new operator and their legal representative.

During the meeting a number of issues were discussed and in particular the issue around residents being disturbed by what they believed were customers from the premises. It was suggested by Lee Smurthwaite that they would look at introducing the provision of food to customers at the end of the night to prevent migration to takeaways. The meeting was concluded with both Lee Smurthwaite and his

solicitor confirming they had some ideas around tackling the dispersal at the end of the night and that they would contact the authorities with these suggestions. It can be said that since the meeting there has been no evidence of the introduction of food nor have the authorities had any contact from either Lee or his solicitor to provide the ideas they had alluded to.

A check of recorded incidents at the premises since the beginning of the year reveals there have been 34 incidents linked to the premises these incidents have themselves lead to 19 crime reports.

A copy of these incidents is attached at Appendix 3.

In relation to these incidents the police would make a number of observations; of the 19 reported crimes 13 relate to assaults, 11 of which have occurred since the beginning of April around the time that the new operators have taken over the premises.

It is further noted that, contained within the details of these incidents, there seems to be a common theme of persons involved in the incidents either as offenders or victims being drunk or affected by drink.

However the most significant observation is that 27 of the 34 incidents have been related to incidents that have occurred after midnight.

It is also understood that the new operators have reduced the level of door supervision at the premises.

In light of these concerns plain clothes officers were tasked to visit these and surrounding premises to see how they were operating. This was scheduled to take place on the evening of Friday 25<sup>th</sup> July 2014.

In view of the concerns and the fact that plain clothes officers were being deployed at the premises the police licensing officer attempted to contact Lee Smurthwaite on his mobile to request a meeting at the premises to discuss the concerns and also to discuss any issues that may come to light as a result of the deployment. There was no reply so a message was left on the answerphone and an e-mail was sent shortly after requesting a meeting.

A copy of this e-mail is attached at Appendix 4.

No response was received and on the evening of Friday 25<sup>th</sup> July 2014 plain clothes officers were deployed to the premises.

In relation to Barristers the officers observed persons openly using drugs in the toilets, they observed what they perceived to be underage persons obtaining alcohol from the bar without challenge and a drunken couple who appeared to have been served with a number of drinks, which were stacked up on the table in front of them.

As a result of these observations and still having had no response from the operators to the request for a meeting, the officer sent a text message to the DPS requesting a meeting. This was responded to by the DPS stating she had passed the message to the operator, despite this still no confirmation from the operator was received so a further message was sent a few days later stating officers would attend the premises at 11.30 am on Wednesday 13<sup>th</sup> August 2014, this was acknowledged by the DPS stating she would be there.

A written copy of the text messages is attached at Appendix 5

Officers from the police and local authority attended the premises on the day prescribed where they were met by the operator Lee Smurthwaite, however despite her confirmation she would be in attendance the DPS was not present and indeed did not attend the meeting.

This was an issue as the enquiries that needed to be carried out in relation to checks of records and CCTV were unable to be completed as the operator was unable to work the CCTV system nor was he able to locate the documents required.

Due to this the results of the visit and associated enquiries are unable to be included in this initial application for review, however will be submitted as additional documentation when finalised.

#### POLICE OBSERVATIONS

It would appear that these premises are no longer effectively being managed and this can be evidenced by the rise in incidents and crimes being recorded in relation to the premises, as well as the observations of the plain clothes police officers.

The police feel that there are no constraints in place on the serving of alcohol to persons who are drunk. There appears to be no restriction on persons attending the premises and being allowed entry when intoxicated which in turn is leading to incidents of crime and disorder. There is inadequate security provision provided for the size and nature of the premises, which the police would say is now operating as a small nightclub. The failure of the premises to manage its customers and the amount of alcohol they are consuming is also having an effect on local residents who are being disturbed by customers leaving the premises in the early hours.

#### POLICE RECOMMENDATIONS

The police have considered all the sanctions available to the licensing committee under the review process and feel the following to be the most appropriate to deal with the issues raised;

The removal of the DPS

The hours of operation at the premises are reduced to allow the provision of licensable activity until Midnight Monday to Sunday

That the premises is open to the public till 00:30 hrs Monday to Sunday.

Any non-standard timings should allow 1 hour extra to those above.

### Barristers, 63-65 Towngate, Leyland

#### History

1. The premises known now as Barristers was formally licensed under the name of the King George IV, which at that time were owned and operated by Punch Taverns PLC.
2. These premises were subject of a review application submitted in March 2008, by the police acting in their capacity as a responsible authority, citing that they felt the operation of the premises was undermining the Licensing Objectives of the Prevention of Crime and Disorder, the Prevention of Public Nuisance and Public Safety.
3. This application was heard by the Licensing Sub –Committee at South Ribble Borough Council on 8<sup>th</sup> May 2008, who after hearing evidence from all parties decided to remove the DPS. The sub-committee amended the hours for the provision of licensable activities and in particular the sale by retail of alcohol to midnight on Saturday through to Thursday and 1am on a Friday. They also imposed a revised set of conditions to replace those currently on the licence.
4. In mid-2009 the premises were taken over by a new operator, Darren Miller, who invested a significant amount of money into a complete refurbishment of the premises and changed its name to Barristers.
5. On 27<sup>th</sup> August 2009 an application from Darren Miller to vary the premises licence was received, the variation sought to increase the hours for the sale of alcohol on Friday, Saturday and Sunday to 01:00 hrs, with an additional hour for the premises to be open to the public, this effectively meant the premises was to close at 02:00 hrs at the weekend.
6. The application also sought to remove two conditions attached to the licence, namely the requirement for a minimum of 3 door supervisors on a Friday and the restriction of entry to customers after midnight on a Friday night.
7. The police did not make any representations to this application and a copy of the police response is attached at Appendix 1a.
8. On 1<sup>st</sup> October 2009 an application was made to transfer the DPS at the premises from Darren Miller to Colin Pendlebury, the police did not make any representations.

9. On 23<sup>rd</sup> October 2009 an application was made to transfer the DPS at the premises from Colin Pendlebury to Martyn Kurt Hennefer, the police did not make any representations.
10. On 15<sup>th</sup> February 2010 an application was made to vary the hours of for the provision of licensable activity by an additional hour on a Thursday through Sunday.
11. This now meant the premises would stop selling alcohol at 01:00 hrs on a Thursday and Sunday and at 02:00 hrs on a Friday and Saturday, further to this the closing hours of the premises were extended by an hour accordingly.
12. The police, although nervous about the extended hours applied for, did not oppose the application as there were no grounds to justify a representation.
13. On 21<sup>st</sup> April 2010 an application was made to transfer the DPS at the premises from Martyn Kurt Hennefer to Darren Miller, the police did not make any representations.
14. On 25<sup>th</sup> August 2010 an application was made to transfer the DPS at the premises from Darren Miller to John James Turton, the police did not make any representations.
15. On 9<sup>th</sup> June 2011 an application was made to transfer the DPS at the premises from John James Turton to Darren Miller, the police did not make any representations.
16. In the summer of 2012 the Police Senior Management Team for Leyland started raising concerns over the number of incidents that appeared to be connected to Barrister's and it was felt they were becoming a "problem premises".
17. This perception was not helped by the fact that a serious assault occurred in the premises on 14<sup>th</sup> July 2012.
18. On 17<sup>th</sup> July 2012 Darren Miller attended Leyland Police Station for a meeting with regards the assault, present at the meeting was the local Police Inspector, as well as the licensing officers from the police and South Ribble Borough Council.
19. On Tuesday 26<sup>th</sup> March 2013 Darren Miller attended Leyland Police Station for a meeting with regards an assault that occurred at the premises on 23<sup>rd</sup>

March, present at the meeting was the local Police Inspector, as well as the licensing officers from the police and South Ribble Borough Council.

20. On 27<sup>th</sup> November 2013 an application was made to transfer the DPS at the premises from Darren Miller to Alison Guyan, the police did not make any representations.

21. On 12<sup>th</sup> May 2014 an application was made to transfer the premises licence into the name of Ravenstone North West Ltd, the police did not make any representations.

With regards the application above the police acknowledge that the existing conditions which are subject of this application were imposed by the Local Authority as a result of the review of the premises licence instigated by the police.

The conditions were imposed in order to resolve issues that were identified as a result of the management at that time. The police are always uneasy about the removal of conditions applied to premises especially after a hearing, however this application comes from a new operator with a proven track record and therefore it is felt reasonable to allow him to operate the premises as he has described and monitor the progress.

The application also seeks to vary slightly the operating hours in relation to licensable activities as well as closing hours, it is noted that as part of the variation there is a 1 hour increase for alcohol sales on a Sunday from Midnight to 1am. However this has not been mirrored in the times for the opening hours of the premises on a Sunday. Therefore as it stands this application would show the premises stopping alcohol sales at 1am but also closing at 1am.

This could pose problems on a Sunday. This has been pointed out to the applicant and he has been advised to amend this.

The police make no representations to this application.

I am Police Constable 2722 Debbie Thompson of the Lancashire Constabulary currently based at Leyland Police station. My current position is Community Beat manager for St Mary's ward area of Leyland. I have worked for Lancashire Constabulary since January 1997 as a response officer, a Trainer and I have been a Community Beat manager in both Avenham and Leyland St Marys area's.

In this time I have gained a great deal of knowledge about policing in the Leyland area and crime patterns in the area.

My current role as a community beat manager is to tackle on going longstanding problems in the community in a defined area and to work with partner agencies to help resolve them.

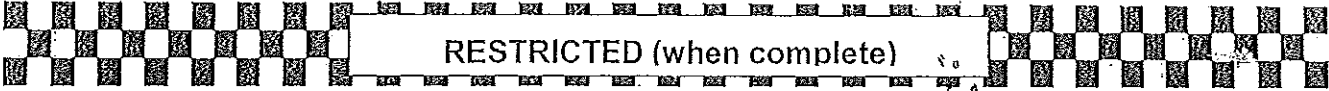
Leyland St Mary's ward is a mix of social housing , high class private housing , shops, large retail stores and social facilities. However the night time economy is mainly based around a small part of the area consisting of Tesco's and the surrounding public houses and clubs which are in close proximity to residential properties.

This statement relates to Barristers Public house at 63 Towngate. Towngate is a busy road and is one of the main streets running through the town. Barristers is situated at a busy junction close to Tesco's Extra. Barristers opens at 10am and during the weekend stays open until 2am. Historically Barristers was called the "King George" and became well known for Anti-Social behaviour issues until finally it closed its doors and was re-opened as Barristers, with a dress code and a new clientele group.

Initially Barristers sustained a good customer base and there was a low level of recorded crime's, however over the last twelve months I have seen an increase in recorded crime and associated anti-social behaviour. The venue has started attracting individuals and groups who are displaying drunken behaviour on arrival, they are rowdy and passers-by can regularly see altercations occurring at the front of the pub in what appears to be considered the smoking area. The overall client group has changed from being of a good standard where a dress code existed to anything now seems to go regarding clothing and footwear alongside drunkenness and rowdy behaviour not being a barrier to entry.

We are receiving regular calls from residents who live in the immediate vicinity of Barristers about the anti-social behaviour that emanates from the establishment. Members of the public feel intimidated by the behaviour of Barristers customers, they spill out in the evenings on the road outside and wander round in the road in varying states of drunkenness showing no regard for motorists and other pedestrians trying to use the pavements. From midnight until closing time at weekends, neighbours and passers by regularly see fighting, arguing, shouting and rowdiness taking place and it is getting to the point where local residents are wishing to make their complaints formal in the form of petitions, complaints to the local councillor ( Phil Hamman) and at the PACT meetings. The overall appearance of Barristers is that of a rowdy drunken establishment where people drink to excess and consider fighting and drunkenness to be part of daily life.

I have responded to drunken males wandering in the area of Barristers at 10am on a Saturday morning. I located them inside Barristers obviously drunk and one of them had been served alcohol even in the state he was displaying.

Local publicans are reporting at the pub watch meeting that customers are leaving their establishments at closing time in an inebriated state and then going into Barristers and being allowed to enter, when they are already drunk. As the premises has a duty of care they should not facilitate the further consumption of alcohol.

Businesses in the area are also affected and in particular Tesco's which has a 24 hour opening policy but on a Friday and Saturday night they close their doors with a cost implication at midnight to avoid drunken revellers entering their store.

Taxis are also a problem as they are not restricted by the door staff and allowed to stop wherever they wish which includes at the traffic lights whilst on green, on the double yellow lines outside Barristers causing other road users to have to manoeuvre round them.

Sometimes they are in such great numbers they cause the road to be blocked and they also become a hazard to pedestrians trying to cross due to the reduction in visibility.

There is a particular problem on Bank Holidays and weekends when the noise levels coming from the pub exceeds what is considered by the residents as an acceptable level, with many of the revellers shouting and using inappropriate language within the hearing of children trying to sleep in their beds.

We have resident who have dogs and they have complained that there are broken bottles in the areas surrounding Barristers.

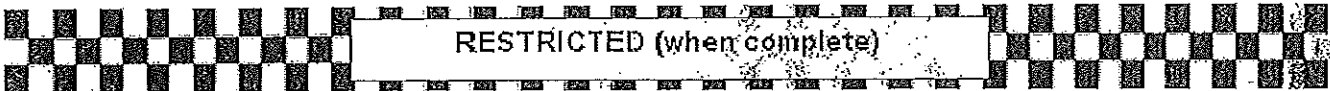
Neighbours complain that drunken revellers urinate on the walls of both Barristers and the properties in the roads in the area. They say that they have seen people do this and and they also complain about the smell it causes.

Due to the amount of drunken people walking past residential properties, most of which are in an unstable condition, giving the residents a perception that there is going to be damage to their property and the overall feeling that they are being targeted effecting their overall quality of life.

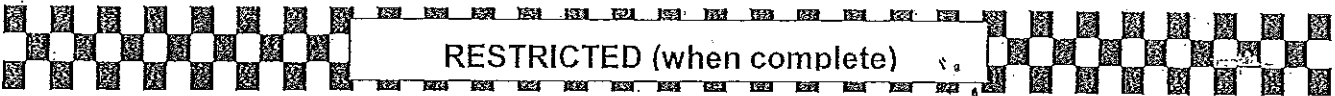
One particular neighbour has written in saying she has Fibro myalgia and needs a good level of sleep in order to be able to function in her daily life, but complains that she is regularly woken at 1am and 3am by screaming and drunken behaviour which is affecting her and her children's lives.

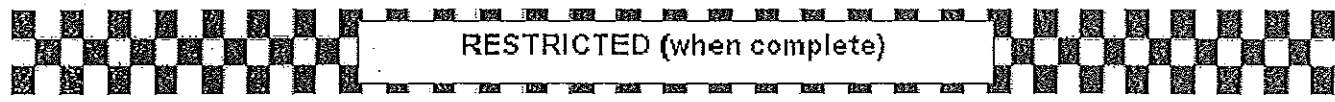
Over the weekend of 8 -10th August 2014 around midnight I was at Leyland Police station when I could hear what appeared to be a very large group outside shouting and chanting, the noise went on for about 5 minutes. I went to the front of the Police station and towards Barristers and observed the tail end of this group walking straight into Barristers without being challenged. A member of the public approached me and complained about the noise that had been created by the group.

The majority of logs are recorded between the hours of midnight and 3am which indicates the problems are occurring when most other establishments have closed and patrons are into extended drinking hours.

I have been a Police officer for almost 18 years and have a vast experience in dealing with Anti-Social Behaviour. I feel this problem is at the point where action needs to be taken to ensure the safety and wellbeing of the neighbours, members of the public and staff. There is a variety of measures that can be put in place to ensure this. The main one being to reduce the hours that Barristers is open, closing around 12 midnight in line with most other establishments in the area would stop the impact on people living in the immediate vicinity allowing them to have a better quality of life. This would also shorten to the opportunity for people to over indulge and this will impact on the levels of anti-social behaviour and crime. The level of door staff is below minimum level on Fridays and Saturdays, currently there are only 3 door staff looking after the doors and the toilets, an increase in the number of door staff would be extremely beneficial. Barriers at the front would stop the customers walking straight out into the busy high street at a very busy junction. Barriers would also stop the problem at the end of the night when large numbers are exiting the pub and congregating on the pavement at the front causing congestion and people to stand in the road in large groups talking. Barristers would also benefit from a taxi rank being set up to efficiently and safely move people on when they leave. This could potentially be arranged in the current taxi rank at Tesco's which is a very short distance away or alternatively in the bus stops opposite when the buses stop running. I would recommend all the measures outlined above due to the high demand for service to the police and feel that if something is not done very quickly a serious life threatening / changing incident will occur.

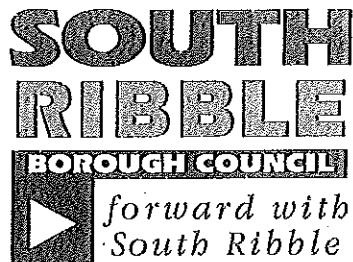

1. The Premises licence holder shall ensure that no supply of alcohol is made under the premises licence-
  - (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence; or

  - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to-
    - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
    - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
  - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic (other than any promotion or discount available to an individual in respect of alcohol for consumption at a table meal, as defined in section 159 of the Act);
  - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less;
  - (d) provision of free or discounted alcohol in relation to the viewing on the premises of a sporting event, where that provision is dependent on-
    - (i) the outcome of a race, competition or other event or process, or
    - (ii) the likelihood of anything occurring or not occurring;
  - (e) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
4. The responsible person shall ensure that no alcohol is dispensed directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
5. The responsible person shall ensure that free tap water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
6. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.  
(2) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.
7. The responsible person shall ensure that-
  - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures-
    - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
    - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
    - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and
  - (b) customers are made aware of the availability of these measures.

**SECURITY PROVISION**

1. The Premises licence holder shall ensure that each individual present on the premises to carry out a security activity [as defined by paragraph 2(1) (a) of Schedule 2 to the Private Security Industry Act 2001] must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

**Licensing Sub-Committee on the 8<sup>th</sup> May 2008 held a hearing in respect of an application from Lancashire Constabulary for a Review of the premises licence at George IV Hotel, 63 Towngate, Leyland, Lancashire PR25 2LR**

The Committee confirmed that the DPS be removed and authorised the times for the carrying out of licensing activities as per the schedule contained elsewhere in the licence.

**The Sub Committee decided to impose additional conditions on the licence:-**

1. Removal of all the existing conditions on the premises licence other than the mandatory conditions and the following new conditions to be applied:

Crime and Disorder

2. The premises shall have a CCTV system installed, operated and maintained to the satisfaction of Lancashire Constabulary.
3. The system shall be digital and have the capability of 24 hour recording the recordings to be kept for 28 days.
4. There shall be a member of staff on duty at all times the premises is open who is trained and capable of providing a copy of any recording to any responsible authority on reasonable request
5. (Condition removed).
6. (Condition removed).
7. The DPS will have a written drugs policy and all staff will have ongoing regular training in respect of its contents. This training will be recorded and copies of these records will be made available on request to any responsible authority.
8. Regular toilet checks will be made whenever the premises open. A record of these checks kept and records will be made available on request of any responsible authority.
9. The DPS will have a written policy in relation to drunkenness and all staff will be subjected to ongoing regular training in respect of its contents. This training will be recorded and copies of these records will be made available on request to any responsible authority.
10. The DPS will keep and maintain an incident recording system where any incidents relating to the premises are recorded. This record will be available on request to any responsible authority
11. Customers shall be prevented from leaving the premises with unsealed glasses, bottles or other containers
12. The DPS will be a regular member of Pubwatch where one exists and abide by its rules and constitution.
13. The premises will use the town centre link radio which should be in the possession of door supervisors when used or a nominated person at any other time. A record of the nominated person shall be kept in incident log as aforementioned.

14. The DPS will have a fire risk assessment and all staff will have a working knowledge of its contents. Staff will receive ongoing training in fire safety and this will be recorded. The aforementioned consultation should be undertaken as soon as possible.
15. The DPS will ensure that there is a written dispersal policy in place at the premises and will utilise this when needed to ensure customers leave the area of the premises safely.

16. No amplified sound will be played in the external areas
17. After 22.00 each day the windows and doors will be kept closed whenever regulated entertainment is taking place.

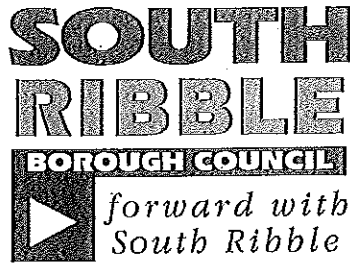

I have received a copy of an application from PS 1506 Bushell dates seeking a review of the above premises licence.

From April 2012 the Licensing Authority has been designated as a Responsible Authority and it is in this capacity that I make the following representation on behalf of the Licensing Authority.

I have had cause to attend the premises on a number of occasions this year following reports of disorder, assaults and complaints from the public about regular disturbance in the early hours of weekend mornings, as a result of Barristers customers leaving the venue when heavily intoxicated.

On 7<sup>th</sup> May 2014 I visited the premises with PS1506 Bushell and PC 2722 Thompson to discuss the increase in the numbers of complaints against the premises. At that time we had received an incomplete application to transfer the premises licence from Darren Miller to Ravenstone NW, who I was led to believe had been responsible for operating the venue since April 2014.

We spoke to Alison Guyan the DPS, as Mr Smurthwaite was not at the premises. We reminded her about the need to ensure that all of the conditions on the licence were observed, particularly in respect of customer dispersal and the sale of alcohol to drunks as these two factors were key in relation to the complaints that were being received.

We reviewed the policies that she was able to produce, but all of them related to Miller Leisure Developments, the previous operator.

On 28<sup>th</sup> May 2014, at the request of Mr Smurthwaite a further meeting was held involving him, Darren Miller and their legal representative, PS1506 Bushell and myself.

We discussed the same issues that we had spoken to Alison about and put the operator on notice that if they were unable to improve the management of the premises and its customers, particularly late at night, and continue to generate reports of crime, disorder and nuisance, the Police would be seeking a review of the licence.

At the conclusion of the meeting Mr Smurthwaite indicated that he would submit details of how they proposed to amend their working practices and policies to mitigate our concerns the following week.

Unfortunately nothing was forthcoming from the premises and the Department continued to receive resident complaints.

On 13<sup>th</sup> August I visited the premises again with PS1506 with the intention of reviewing the premises incident logs and CCTV footage for those incidents which are listed ~~highlighted~~ in Appendix 3 of the Police's application.

Of the 23 Police logs generated since April 2014, only 6 had resulted in the completion of incident reports by the premises, despite the following being a condition of the Licence.

*"10. The DPS will keep and maintain an incident recording system where any incidents relating to the premises are recorded. This record will be available on request to any responsible authority".*

I have attached copies of these reports as appendix A.

As Alison was not present at this meeting (Her absence being subsequently reported as due to illness) we were only able to speak to Mr Smurthwaite and he was unable to operate the CCTV system, despite the following being a condition of the licence.

*"4. There shall be a member of staff on duty at all times the premises is open who is trained and capable of providing a copy of any recording to any responsible authority on reasonable request".*

I revisited the premises that evening, when Alison was available and collected 5 lots of footage which she was able to produce on discs.

We also discussed re-siting one of the cameras to cover the corridor entrance to the male toilets, to assist the premises in being able to prevent drug use in this area as concerns had been raised about patrons supplying and using drugs in the male toilets by the plain clothes officers who had been inside the premises on the evening of Friday 25<sup>th</sup> July 2014.

As the majority of incidents and complaints about these premises are generated in the early hours of the morning I fully support the Police's application to seek a reduction in the trading hours.

I feel very strongly that the Premises License for Barristers should be reviewed.

#### To Prevent Public Nuisance

I live just a few minutes away from Barristers on Spring Gardens which is a main route home for many of their customers in the early hours of the morning. This is particularly obvious Fridays and Saturdays due to noise and drunken behaviour.

Shouting, screaming, fighting and foul language are a regular occurrence between approximately midnight and 3am as are throwing bottles and cans into hedges and front gardens and using the street as a public toilet.

#### To prevent Crime and Disorder

My car has been damaged on several occasions which have been reported to the police including damage to a wing mirror, the rear wiper being ripped off the car and the car bonnet being sprayed with sticky foam.

Two of my close neighbours have had their front garden fences damaged by being 'kicked-in'. Glass bottles are smashed in the street and broken glass left in the street and on the pavement.

I work full-time during the week and used to look forward to the weekends but find it difficult to relax and sleep at night because of all the antisocial behaviour which I believe is caused by the current licensing hours and the amount of alcohol consumed at Barristers.

I would like to see the licensing hours at Barristers greatly reduced or for Barristers to be closed or relocated where their drunken customers cannot disrupt the lives of local residents.

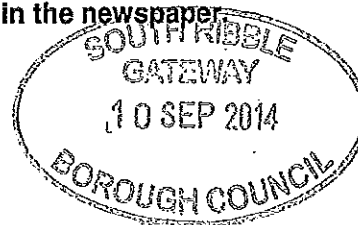
