1. PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

To provide an overview of the application and inform Members of the relevant parts of statute and guidance relating to the review application.

4. BACKGROUND TO THE REPORT

4.1 On the 4th June 2018 the premises was visited by Mark Marshall in order to carry out a routine compliance check. Numerous matters were found and later communicated in writing to the licence holder, a summary of the problems were;

No Proof of Age Training available for Donna Bamber who had been employed at the premises for 1 month, fire separation issues and Work Place safety problems particularly in relation to flooring and storage areas.

4.2 At approximately 17.30 hrs on the 24th August 2018 a joint visit to the premises took place, by representatives from the Home Office, authorised to carry out Immigration Enforcement, Lancashire Fire and Rescue and Officers from the Licensing Authority.

On entry there was one male behind the counter. All officers were identified and an explanation of the reason for the visit was given. There was one customer waiting at the till point with items due to be paid for, the male behind the counter was NADEERA KAUSHIKA RUPASIGHE

Enquires were made by Home Office staff regarding RUPASIGHEs status and after about 10 minutes it had been revealed that he did not have rights to work in the UK. A search of the male's mobile phone revealed text messages going back to December of 2017 which revealed that he had been employed at the shop since at least December 2017.

The licence holder RANGA RATNASEKERA was informed that she would be issued with a civil penalty for employing an illegal worker.

- 4.3 At 18.48hrs on the 7th September 2018 an underage volunteer was sent into the premises by a police constable to attempt to buy alcohol as part of a directed test purchase exercise. The sale occurred and 4 cans of Strongbow (dark fruits) at a price of £5.50 were sold to the volunteer.
 - At 18.55hrs Mark Marshall returned to speak with the seller in the company of the Police Officer and a PCSO. The staff member was known to be Donna Bamber.
- 4.4 At 10.50hrs on the 10th September 2018 the premises was visited in order to check if staff training was in place which may provide a defence for the licence holder for the unlawful sale. Section 146 (6) of the Licensing Act 2003 states:

Where a person ("the accused") is charged with an offence under this section by reason of the act or default of some other person, it is a defence that the accused exercised all due diligence to avoid committing it.

If training records were in place, providing they were adequate this would have provided a due diligence defence, however the licence holder was unable to produce any documented training for staff. In addition the Premises licence also has a condition on the licence which states:

All staff be trained regarding age related sales, details of which should be documented and produced on the reasonable request of any officer from a Responsible Authority.

5 REPRESENTATIONS FROM RESPONSIBLE AUTHORITIES

- 5.1 The Home Office have submitted a written representaion attached as Appendix A.
- 6. DECISION TO BE MADE BY THE LICENSING ACT PANEL

Determination of an application under Section 52 of the Licensing Act 2003

6.1 Numerous paragraphs of the Section 182 Guidance are worthy of mention;

- 11.19 Where the licensing authority considers that action under its statutory powers is appropriate, it may take any of the following steps:
 - modify the conditions of the premises licence (which includes adding new conditions or any alteration or omission of an existing condition), for example, by reducing the hours of opening or by requiring door supervisors at particular times:
 - exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence, for example, to exclude the performance of live music or playing of recorded music (where it is not within the incidental live and recorded music exemption)
 - remove the designated premises supervisor, for example, because they consider that the problems are the result of poor management;
 - suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months;
 - revoke the licence.
- 11.20 In deciding which of these powers to invoke, it is expected that licensing authorities should so far as possible seek to establish the cause or causes of the concerns that the representations identify. The remedial action taken should generally be directed at these causes and should always be no more than an appropriate and proportionate response to address the causes of concern that instigated the review.
- 11.27 There is certain criminal activity that may arise in connection with licensed premises which should be treated particularly seriously. These are the use of the licensed premises:
 - for the sale and distribution of drugs controlled under the Misuse of Drugs Act 1971 and the laundering of the proceeds of drugs crime;
 - for the sale and distribution of illegal firearms;
 - for the evasion of copyright in respect of pirated or unlicensed films and music, which does considerable damage to the industries affected;
 - for the illegal purchase and consumption of alcohol by minors which impacts on the health, educational attainment, employment prospects and propensity for crime of young people;
 - for prostitution or the sale of unlawful pornography;
 - by organised groups of paedophiles to groom children;
 - as the base for the organisation of criminal activity, particularly by gangs

for the organisation of racist activity or the promotion of racist attacks;

- for employing a person who is disqualified from that work by reason of their immigration status in the UK;
- for unlawful gambling; and
- for the sale or storage of smuggled tobacco and alcohol.
- 11.28 It is envisaged that licensing authorities, the police, the Home Office (Immigration Enforcement) and other law enforcement agencies, which are responsible authorities, will use the review procedures effectively to deter such activities and crime. Where reviews arise and the licensing authority determines that the crime prevention objective is being undermined through the premises being used to further crimes, it is expected that revocation of the licence even in the first instance should be seriously considered.

The Panel are asked to consider the seriousness of the issues disclosed and deal with this application by taking account of;

- 1. Its own policy; and
- 2. Secretary of State Guidance (section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003).

8. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

8.1 There are no direct financial implications arising from this report.

9. LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

9.1 The Licensing Authority are under a statutory duty to facilitate the review hearing. When determining this hearing the Council must comply with the rules of natural justice. The decision taken by the panel should be appropriate and proportionate in addressing any undermining of the licensing objectives

Any party at the hearing has a right to appeal the decision to the Magistrates Court.

Subject: Moss Lane Convenience Store

On the 24/8/18 Immigration Enofrcement conducted a joint licensing visit with South Ribble Licensing to Moss Lane Convenience Store, 41 Moss Lane, Leyland, PR25 4XA.

Upon entry there was one male working alone at the store who we now know to be Nadeera Rupasinghe a Sri Lankan male born 02/11/81.

Checks on Home Office systems showed that subject entered the UK on a Tier 4 student visa as the dependant partner of his wife Udeshie Chinthani Anada De Silvee WETHTHAMUNI on a visa valid from 25/01/10 to 31/12/11. They were granted further leave again as a Tier 4 student and Nadeera as a dependant partner until 30/05/15. A further application was raised on 17/07/15 for a Tier 2 visa which is gradute study level for Udeshi allowing Nadeera to remain and work as her dependant but this was refused on 13/03/17, an appeal was raised and the outcome was maintained. He then claimed asylum on 13/06/17 and this was refused on 12/12/17. There is a 1st tier review from 13/07/18 that is still outstanding however subject is now out of time and is an overstayer in the UK.

When Nadeera claimed asylum he was given an Asylum Registration Card (ARC) which clearly states on it EMPLOYMENT PROHIBITED, when he sought employment at Moss Lane Convenience Store it is the responsibility of the owner of the business to complete a right to work search for any foreign national in the UK which has been prompted and is current knowledge for employers especially license holders, these checks are simple and easy to complete as it is a short form on the gov.uk website which is answered within 5 working days and confirms if the person has the right ot work in the UK.

Upon questioning of the Ranga RATNASKERA the premise licence holder confirmed that he knew he was to complete checks and asked for Home Office letters to confirm his right to work in the UK but never checked with the Right to work checking service or the Home Office.

Ranga confirmed that Nadeera has been working on and off in the store since December 2017 when Nadeera had claimed asylum in June 2017 and was informed that he was prohibited from taking employment, a simple check would of confirmed that Nadeera had no permission to work and ignorance of this fact is not a statutory excuse.

Therefore a civil penalty has now been served against Ranga and Moss Lane Convenience store and is still being processed at this time.

Mr Ichira YAYTHUGODA 07/04/80, owners husband stated he saw Mr RUPASINGHE's application that he was making to the Home Office.

Q-Did you take a copy of the visa or the application?

No, stated that Mr RUPASINGHE would give them a copy when he got granted.

Employment of illegal Workers

The latest revision of the Section 182 Guidance makes numerous references to the employment of illegal workers, the paragraphs below explain how the employment of illegal workers ties in with the Crime and Disorder Objective and also highlights it as an issue that Licensing Authorities should take very seriously;

- 9.25The Immigration Act 2016 made the Secretary of State a responsible authority in respect of premises licensed to sell alcohol or late night refreshment with effect from 6 April 2017. In effect this conveys the role of responsible authority to Home Office Immigration Enforcement who exercises the powers on the Secretary of State's behalf. When Immigration Enforcement exercises its powers as a responsible authority it will do so in respect of the prevention of crime and disorder licensing objective because it is concerned with the prevention of illegal working or immigration offences more broadly.
- 11.18However, where responsible authorities such as the police or environmental health officers have already issued warnings requiring improvement either orally or in writing that have failed as part of their own stepped approach to address concerns, licensing authorities should not merely repeat that approach and should take this into account when considering what further action is appropriate. Similarly, licensing authorities may take into account any civil immigration penalties which a licence holder has been required to pay for employing an illegal worker.

The items shown do not all directly impact on Public safety, mainly due to the fact that the public do not spend any significant amount of time on the premises, but licence holders should respond to previous concerns raised especially where they are legal requirements or could directly compromise the safety of the building, all the matters that have not been rectified are either legal requirements or directly compromise the safety of the building.

I refer to our recent visit to your premises, the purpose being to check compliance with your licensing conditions and ensure the Licensing Objectives were being promoted.

Your Premises Licence includes various conditions licence, namely;

OFF-LICENCES AND OFF-SALES DEPARTMENTS OF ON-LICENCED PREMISES - PERMITTED HOURS

Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied except during permitted hours.

In this condition, permitted hours means:

- a. On weekdays, other than Christmas Day, 8 a.m. to 11 p.m.
- b. On Sundays, other than Christmas Day, 10 a.m. to 10.30 p.m.
- c. On Christmas Day, 12 noon to 3 p.m. and 7 p.m. to 10.30 p.m.
- d. On Good Friday, 8 a.m. to 10.30 p.m.

The above restrictions do not prohibit:

- (a) the ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises, or the despatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered;
- (b) the sale of alcohol to a trader or club for the purposes of the trade or club;
- (c) the sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces;


OFF-LICENSED CONSUMPTION



The store room was disorganised and presented difficulties for staff who would need to mannual handle stock.

The fire extingishers were 12 months over due a service/inspection.





The flooring near the front entrance was in a poor condition with numerous tears that presented a tripping hazard for the public

A large hole in the ceiling in the store room comprised the fire separation between floors.





To summarise the issues raised, the training records being deficient does constitute a breach of your licence which is also an offence under the Licensing Act 2003, Section 136 of the Act and now carries an unlimited fine and or up to 6 months in prison. The poor maintenance of the premises could present a risk to the Public Safety Licensing Objective if not rectified. A relevant paragraph of the Section 182 Guidance is found below;

11.10 Where authorised persons and responsible authorities have concerns about problems identified at premises, it is good practice for them to give licence holders early warning of their concerns and the need for improvement, and where possible they should advise the licence or certificate holder of the steps they need to take to address those concerns. A failure by the holder to respond to such warnings is expected to lead to a decision to apply for a review. Co-operation at a local level in promoting the licensing objectives should be encouraged and reviews should not be used to undermine this co-operation.



Card Recognition Guide

5 - Step Checking Process

STEP 1 - Check the PASS Hologram

- Look for the 3D effect in the background of the hologram
- Look for the small PASS text in the background
- The PASS hologram must be flush with the plastic of the card – NOT stuck on top of plastic.

STEP 2 - Check the Photograph

- Ensure that the photograph is of the person presenting the card – if necessary, politely ask the person to remove their hood, hat or sunglasses to be sure.
- The photograph must be printed directly on to the plastic of the card NOT stuck on top of the plastic.

STEP 3 - Check the Date of Birth

- Make sure they are old enough to buy the goods or services requested. Check the printed D.O.B and date when 18.
- The date of birth must be printed on to the plastic NOT handwritten or stuck on the top of the plastic. (Blackpool Council's 18+ Card has the date when 18 embossed (raised)

STEP 4 - Check the Card

- Ensure the card has not been tampered with or altered
- Feel the card it should be completely smooth
 NO ridges or anything stuck on to the card.

STEP 5 - Check the Person

- If you are still unsure about a person's age, your legal responsibility is to refuse to sell.
- YOUR PERSONAL SAFETY IS THE MOST IMPORTANT THING
- If you feel threatened, call your supervisor or manager for assistance.

If you refuse to sell...

If you refuse to sell items because you believe the person is too young, once the person has left report the incident to your supervisor or manager, and record the details in the "Refusal Record Book".





What You Are Looking For:

Driving Licence

Every young person today should be in possession of a Photo card Driving Licence, the old paper licences have been virtually phased out.


The first thing you should do is study the document to see if it is genuine, as the internet is now a source where lots of 'Novelty Style' I.D's are sold, often called European Driving Permits.

The following example is an illustration of a FALSE "DRIVING PERMIT" that is available on the internet, and at first glance can be very convincing.

Card with a hologram



Note the hologram. It has stars and waved lines. This is a scanned image of the card and so it is impossible to show you the colours and how the hologram changes shape when the card is moved at different angles to the light.



Note the EDP text and stars using a special security ink that causes it to look brown in colour at some angles yet the ink is a bright gold colour when viewed at other angles.

Genuine Driving Licences

The first thing you are looking for is the UK which is placed top left of the card, then the word Driving Licence across the middle of the card.

Then feel item 1 on the licence which is the surname, as you feel across with your index finger the lettering should be raised, same with item 9, this is the category of entitlements, this should also be raised.

The licence will have a hologram which can vary dependant on the date of issue.

You then need to check: the following;

- Face
- Date of birth
- Name

Passports UK


The premises also accept UK Passports. The same 3 stage process should be employed;

- 1. Ask for the ID
- 2. Check the validity of the document
 - Hologram across the photo
 - Date of birth corresponds with the serial number across the bottom
 - The passport is valid and in date (date of expiry)
- 3. Check the owner
 - Face (is it them)
 - Name and date of birth (does it correspond with the answer given and match up with serial number across the bottom)

Passports and driving licences are subject to copying and altering, in particular the date of birth section. Professional looking overlays can be applied to the documents but are mounted over the laminated surface of the document so will deteriorate if you scratch the surface where the date of birth appears.

The serial number at the foot of the passport will also contain the date of birth and the driver number on a drivers licence also contains the owner's date of birth.

The following examples teach you to make efficient verifications:



Licensing policy paragraph 3.9.2

Underage sales

The licensing authority is concerned about the availability of alcohol to persons under the age of 18 within the area. Aside from the obvious health problems, and the enhanced chances of teenage pregnancy, the community suffers from antisocial behaviour caused by excessive consumption of alcohol by young people.

The licensing committee will view very seriously premises reviewed due to underage sales and although each review application will be determined on its own merits, licence holders will be expected to explain how the sales took place and what measures have been put in place to minimise the risk of such sales taking place again.

Defences

The defences in law are found in Section 146(4) (a) and (b) of the Licensing Act 2003 which states:

Where a person is charged with an offence under this section by reason of his own conduct it is a defence that-

- a) He believed that the individual was 18 or over and
- b) Either
 - (i) He had taken all reasonable steps to establish the individuals age or
 - (ii) Nobody could reasonably have suspected from the individuals appearance that he was aged under 18

Subsection (5) clarifies what "all reasonable steps to establish a person's age" means. A person is treated as having taken all reasonable steps to establish an individual's age if:

- a) He asked the individual for evidence of his age and
- b) The evidence would have convinced a reasonable person

Reducing the Risks of Underage Sales

There are two different threats in relation to serving alcohol to children;

1. Test Purchasing

This is where underage people are sent into premises by the Police and Trading Standards to try and buy alcohol, if a sale is obtained then action is likely to follow

2. Fraudulent or Borrowed ID

Examples within this training pack show the quality of fraudulent documents but further threats include altered or borrowed ID; remember the test is that the ID would have convinced a reasonable person so by employing the 3 point check (the rule of 3) you can meet this "Reasonable Person" test.

To recap, the stages are;

- Ask for the ID This meets section 146(a)
 (i) Steps to establish the age
- Check the validity of the document
- Checking the owner

The Law

It is against the law to sell/supply alcohol to any person under the age of 18 years.

It is against the law for a person under the age of 18 to consume alcohol on relevant premises.

It is an offence to purchase or attempt to purchase alcohol on behalf of an individual who is under the age of 18.

It is an offence for an individual under the age of 18 to purchase or attempt to purchase alcohol.

Exemptions

If an individual is aged 16 or 17, an alcoholic drink of beer, wine or cider is allowed as an accompaniment to a table meal as long as the individual is accompanied by someone over the age of 18. However the alcohol drink must be purchased by an individual who is over the age of 18.

An individual under the age of 18 is exempt from prosecution for purchasing or attempting to purchase alcohol at the request of a constable or a weights and measures inspector who is acting in the course of their duty.

Challenge 21

Challenge 21 is an initiative brought in to help in the assistance of identifying persons under the age of 18.

IF YOU APPEAR TO BE UNDER 21 YOU WILL BE ASKED TO PROVE YOU ARE OVER 18.

Signs of Underage

- Signs that someone maybe underage include: -
- Appearance over dressed, excessive make-up etc
- Nervousness shaking, looking away/around, fidgety

Test Purchasing

Police Officers along with Weights & Measures Inspectors regularly carry out test purchase operations where persons no older than 18 months under the age of 18 will attempt to purchase alcohol.

Forms of ID

- Acceptable forms of ID include
- Passport
- Driving Licence
- 'Pass' accredited proof of age cards

The 'Pass' accredited cards have a holographic logo on the front of the card. If the card does not have the hologram, do not accept it. The local Trading Standards may also have a 'Pass' Accredited card.

All records must include the staff signature who has undertaken the training and the date given. This must be corroborated with a dated signature from the person who has given the training.

Please note, these are only guidelines of what would be expected to be seen in a training package. Your own must be made specific to your premises.

ANNEX 1- MANDATORY CONDITIONS

- 1 No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence
 - a) At a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence,

or

- b) At a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- 2 Every supply of alcohol under the premise licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 3 (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
 - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either a holographic mark, or an ultraviolet feature.
- 4 (1) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
 - (2) In this condition:
 - a. "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula $P = D + (D \times V)$, where
 - i. P is the permitted price,
 - ii. D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
 - iii. V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
 - b. "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;

- c. "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence
 - i. the holder of the premises licence,
 - ii. the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - iii. the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- d. "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- e. "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- (3) Where the permitted price would not be a whole number of pennies, the permitted price shall be taken to be the price rounded up to the nearest penny.
- (4) Where the permitted price on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax, the permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

ANNEX 2 - CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE

Challenge 25 proof of age policy.

The Licence holder and the DPS is to support and rigorously enforce a Challenge 25 proof of age policy.

Any person who looks or appears to be under the age of 25 shall be asked to provide identification that they are over the age of 18. The following are the only forms of identification acceptable:

- i. UK photo driving licence
- ii. Passport
- iii. Proof of Age Standards Scheme Card

OR any other nationally or locally approved form of identification which may be introduced in the future. If no suitable identification is provided, sale of alcohol to them will be refused. Signs promoting this policy shall be prominently displayed at public entrances and alcohol sales areas.

OFF-LICENCES AND OFF-SALES DEPARTMENTS OF ON-LICENCED PREMISES - PERMITTED HOURS

1. Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied except during permitted hours.

In this condition, permitted hours means:

- a. On weekdays, other than Christmas Day, 8 a.m. to 11 p.m.
- b. On Sundays, other than Christmas Day, 10 a.m. to 10.30 p.m.
- c. On Christmas Day, 12 noon to 3 p.m. and 7 p.m. to 10.30 p.m.
- d. On Good Friday, 8 a.m. to 10.30 p.m.

The above restrictions do not prohibit:

- (a) the ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises, or the despatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered;
- (b) the sale of alcohol to a trader or club for the purposes of the trade or club;
- (c) the sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces;

OFF-LICENSED CONSUMPTION

1. Alcohol shall not be sold in an open container or be consumed in the licensed premises.

1. PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

To provide an overview of the application and inform Members of the relevant parts of statute and guidance relating to the review application.

4. BACKGROUND TO THE REPORT

4.1 At approximately 20:35 hrs on the 24th August 2018 a joint visit to the premises took place, by representatives from the Home Office, authorised to carry out Immigration Enforcement, Lancashire Fire and Rescue and Officers from the Licensing Authority.

4.2 All staff members were checked and no issues were disclosed with regards to Rights to work in the UK. There were numerous regulatory concerns that came to light on this inspection, items included.

- 1. Fire Safety issues
- 2. Housing Offences
- 3. Health Act 2006 Offences

4.3 Fire Safety Issues

Numerous areas of concerns were found by officers on the evening of the 24/08/2018:

- 1. Fire Alarm inoperable/no evidence of testing
- 2. Emergency lighting, no evidence of testing
- 3. Defective fire doors compromising the means of escape
- 4. Unmaintained firefighting equipment.
- 5. Obstructions and hazards on the escape route.
- 6. Fire detection systems defective

The bedroom that had been prohibited by the Housing Department appeared to still be in use.

This resulted in a further enforcement notice being issued on the 29/08/2018 for the following fire safety issues by Lancashire Fire and Rescue.

- 1. The fire risk assessment had still not been completed.
- 2. The fire alarm had not been maintained and tested on a weekly basis in accordance with BS5839-1.
- 3. The emergency lighting had not been maintained and tested on a monthly basis in accordance with BS5266.
- 4. The fire door to the kitchen was again nailed in the open position.

Historically, the Fire Service have experienced problems in respect of these premises.

On 13/10/2015 following a complaint from a member of the public Lancashire Fire and Rescue Service found several fire safety issues which resulted in an enforcement notice being issued:

- 1. No fire risk assessment completed
- 2. Fire alarm inadequately maintained
- 3. Emergency lighting inadequately maintained
- 4. Inadequate Fire alarm system (fire alarm had no power)
- 5. Inadequate fire separation (kitchen fire door nailed open)
- 6. Firefighting equipment inadequately maintained

A follow up inspection was performed by the Fire Safety Inspector on the 17/11/2015 and the enforcement notice was withdrawn as the majority of the work had been completed and an agreed action plan was issued with instructions given to complete a fire risk assessment.

The Fire Safety Inspector attended the premises on the 17/01/2017 at the request of South Ribble Borough Council housing department. The housing department prohibited the use of the bedroom for residential accommodation under the Housing Act 2004.

4.4 Housing Offences

On the 23rd January 2017 a prohibition notice was issued by South Ribble Borough Council, preventing a room on the first floor of the premises from being used as living accommodation, numerous hazards were identified as being the reason for the action.

On the evening of the 24th August it was evident that 3 staff members were living in the room which appeared to be in a very poor state. Many personal items such as personal correspondence, washing a shaving kit and many items of clothing were visible. Whilst this matter is not necessarily relevant to the licensing objectives it demonstrates a general disregard for legal compliance issues and legal orders. In addition any person sleeping in this room would be at significant risk if there was an outbreak of fire due to defective fire doors, no fire alarm and hazards on the escape route.

4.5 Health Act 2006 Offences

Section 8 of the Health Act 2006 creates an offence for any person in control of a smoke free premises who fails to prevent a person smoking. On the evening of the 24th August there was evidence of smoking occurring in the fire exit/landing area of the first floor.

4.6 Licensing Conditions

At 21.55 on the 4th September 2018 the premises was visited by Licensing Officers in order to check the terms of the premises Licence, There are 4 conditions within annex 2 on the Premises Licence, they are;

- 1. A challenge 21 policy will be in place.
- 2. Regular inspections of the premises will take place.
- 3. Ongoing staff training
- 4. There shall be a digital CCTV system on the premises to cover the entrance door and restaurant. This will record 31 days digitally. The recordings should be made available to the police upon reasonable request.

Upon requesting evidence in respect of the above licensing conditions, the Premises Licence Holder/DPS – Mr Bhuiyan was unable to show compliance. Whilst condition 2 on the Licence is not precise or specific with regards to the inspections, given the conditions that prevailed on the evening of the 24th August 2018 it would appear also that this condition has been ignored.

The premises Licence holder and DPS are one and the same person, the Section 182 Guidance indicates that a DPS should be a single point of contact responsible for day to day compliance issues, it would appear that the DPS is the root cause of the problems at this premises and any remedial action should aim to focus on the root cause.

5 REPRESENTATIONS FROM RESPONSIBLE AUTHORITIES

5.1 The Lancashire Fire Service have submitted a written representation attached as Appendix B.

6. DECISION TO BE MADE BY THE LICENSING ACT PANEL

6.1 Determination of an application under Section 52 of the Licensing Act 2003

Under Section 52 Licensing Act 2003 the Authority must have regard to the application and any relevant representations and take such steps ...(as are outlined below)... if any, as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

The steps are:-

- a. to modify the conditions on the licence
- b. to exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence
- c. to remove the designated premises supervisor
- d. to suspend the licence for a period not exceeding 3 months
- e. to revoke the licence.

Obviously the Committee can also choose to do nothing for example if the application is frivolous, vexatious or repetitive and the Committee must ensure that any action they take is proportionate to the four licensing objectives.

- 6.2 Numerous paragraphs of the Section 182 Guidance are worthy of mention;
 - 2.7 Licence holders have a responsibility to ensure the safety of those using their premises, as a part of their duties under the 2003 Act. This concerns the safety of people using the relevant premises rather than public health which is addressed in other legislation. Physical safety includes the prevention of accidents and injuries and other immediate harms that can result from alcohol consumption such as unconsciousness or alcohol poisoning. Conditions relating to public safety may also promote the crime and disorder objective as noted above. There will of course be occasions when a public safety condition could incidentally benefit a person's health more generally, but it should not be the purpose of the condition as this would be outside the licensing authority's powers (be ultra vires) under the 2003 Act. Conditions should not be imposed on a premises licence or club premises certificate which relate to cleanliness or hygiene.
 - 2.8 A number of matters should be considered in relation to public safety. These may include:
 - Fire safety:
 - Ensuring appropriate access for emergency services such as ambulances;
 - Good communication with local authorities and emergency services, for example communications networks with the police and signing up for local incident alerts (see paragraph 2.4 above);
 - Ensuring the presence of trained first aiders on the premises and appropriate first aid kits:
 - Ensuring the safety of people when leaving the premises (for example, through the provision of information on late-night transportation);
 - Ensuring appropriate and frequent waste disposal, particularly of glass bottles;
 - Ensuring appropriate limits on the maximum capacity of the premises (see paragraphs 2.12-2.13, and Chapter 10; and
 - Considering the use of CCTV in and around the premises (as noted in paragraph 2.3 above, this may also assist with promoting the crime and disorder objective).

2.11 Where there is a requirement in other legislation for premises open to the public or for employers to possess certificates attesting to the safety or satisfactory nature of certain equipment or fixtures on the premises, it would be inappropriate for a licensing condition to require possession of such a certificate. However, it would be permissible to require as a condition of a licence or certificate, if appropriate, checks on this equipment to be conducted at specified intervals and for evidence of these checks to be retained by the premises licence holder or club provided this does not duplicate or gold-plate a requirement in other legislation. Similarly, it would be permissible for licensing authorities, if they receive relevant representations from responsible authorities or any other persons, to attach conditions which require equipment of particular standards to be maintained on the premises. Responsible authorities – such as health and safety authorities – should therefore make their expectations clear in this respect to enable prospective licence holders or clubs to prepare effective operating schedules and club operating schedules.

11.20 In deciding which of these powers to invoke, it is expected that licensing authorities should so far as possible seek to establish the cause or causes of the concerns that the representations identify. The remedial action taken should generally be directed at these causes and should always be no more than an appropriate and proportionate response to address the causes of concern that instigated the review.

The Council must carry out its licensing functions with the intention of promoting the licensing objectives.

The licensing objectives are:-

- a) The prevention of crime and disorder;
- b) Public safety;
- c) The prevention of public nuisance; and
- d) The protection of children from harm.

The Panel are asked to consider the seriousness of the issues disclosed and deal with this application and take regard of;

- 1. Its own policy; and
- 2. Secretary of State Guidance (section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003).

8. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no direct financial implications arising from this report

9. LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

The Licensing Authority are under a statutory duty to facilitate the Review Hearing. When determining this hearing the Council must comply with the rules of natural justice.

Any party to the proceedings have the right to appeal the decision to the Magistrates Court.

Photo to the left shows fire alarm in fault, the alarm should show one single power light



Photo to the left shows the fire door to the kitchen which was nailed open. This practice compromised the escape route




Photo to the left shows the firefighting equipment was last serviced in November 2015. Therefore the equipment was almost 2 years overdue a service.



Photo to the left shows CO 2 cylinders, 1 of which is unsupported, in the event of an emergency evacuation this would be likely to fall and cause a serious hazard at the foot of the stairs.




Photo to the left shows pressurised CO 2 cylinders that should be chained to the wall or layed down and chocked along with accelerants such as engine and oil and paint stored at the stop of the emergency route. All of the items would present a significant hazard in the event of an emergency escape.



Photo to the left show the smoke detector activated, this would ordinarily trigger the fire alarm, as the alarm was in fault mode this smoke detection would no longer function until it and the alarm were properly re set.






Photo to the left was taken on the landing /fire exit, this area of the building would be covered by the Health Act 2006

- 1. A challenge 21 policy will be in place.
- 2. Regular inspections of the premises will take place.
- 3. Ongoing staff training
- 4. There shall be a digital CCTV system on the premises to cover the entrance door and restaurant. This will record 31 days digitally. The recordings should be made available to the police upon reasonable request.

On the evening officers spoke with Alamin Bhuiyan 01/10/1970, this male is the Licence Holder and DPS, he confirmed that there was no CCTV installed at the premises and he had no documentation or staff training to demonstrate that a Challenge 21 policy was in place.

Whilst condition 2 on the licence is not precise or specific with regards to the inspections, given the conditions that prevailed on the evening of the 24th August 2018 it would appear also that this condition has been ignored.

Conclusion

Licensing Conditions at this premises appear to have been ignored for many years in addition to these oversight the issues relating to Public Safety have occurred in the past with the Lancashire Fire and Rescue Services having experienced similar problems.

The premises licence holder and DPS are one and the same person, the Section 182 Guidance indicates that a DPS should be a single point of contact responsible for day to day compliance issues, it would appear that the DPS is the root cause of the problems at this premises and any remedial action should aim to focus on the root cause.

I first visited the premises on 13/10/2015 following a complaint from a member of the public and found several fire safety issues these included:

No fire risk assessment completed
Fire alarm inadequately maintained
Emergency lighting inadequately maintained
Inadequate Fire alarm system (fire alarm had no power)
Inadequate fire separation (kitchen fire door nailed open)
Firefighting equipment inadequately maintained

An enforcement notice was issued.

Following this inspection a follow up inspection was carried out on the 17/11/2015 and the enforcement notice was withdrawn as the majority of the work had been completed and an agreed action plan was issued with instructions given to complete a fire risk assessment.

I attended the premises on the 17/01/2017 at the request of South Ribble Borough Council housing department. The housing department prohibited the use of the bedroom for residential accommodation under the Housing Act 2004.

During a joint visit with immigration and the licensing department from South Ribble Borough Council on the 24.08.2018 similar issue were found.
